SET UP & GO

The first time you turn on your phone, a setup wizard guides you through:

- Setting up your Wi-Fi™ connection.
- · Signing in to your existing Google account.

Note: If you don't have a Google account, you can create one using the wizard.

Tip: Remember to write down your user name and password, and keep them in a safe place.

- Setting up additional email accounts, such as POP3, IMAP, or Microsoft™ Exchange.
- · Loading contacts from your SIM card.
- Selecting your keypad type.

Note: This phone supports data-intensive apps and services. It is strongly recommended that you purchase a data plan that meets your needs. Contact your service provider for details.

TURN IT ON & OFF

To turn on your phone, press and hold End/Power .

To turn off your phone, press and hold End/Power , then touch **Power off**.

TOUCHSCREEN & KEYS

a few essentials

TOUCHSCREEN ON/OFF

Your touchscreen is on when you need it and off when you don't.

- To make your touchscreen sleep or wake up, just press Screen Lock .
- When you hold the phone to your ear during calls, your touchscreen sleeps to prevent accidental touches.
- To let the touchscreen adjust brightness automatically, touch Menu (B) > Settings > Sound & display > Brightness and check Automatic brightness.

Note: Your touchscreen might stay dark if the sensor just above it is covered. Don't use



covers or screen protectors (even clear ones) that cover this sensor. To find Motorola accessories for your phone, visit www.motorola.com/products.

TOUCH TIPS

TOUCH

To choose an icon or option, *touch* it. Try it: In the home screen, touch




TOUCH & HOLD

To open special options, touch and hold an icon or other item. Try it: In the home screen, touch

Contacts, then touch and hold a contact to open options.





DRAG

To scroll through a list or move slowly, *drag* up or down the touchscreen. Try it: In the <u>home</u> screen, touch

Contacts, then drag vour Contacts list up or down.

Tip: When you drag or flick a list, a *scroll bar* appears on the right. Drag the scroll bar to move the list to a letter A - Z.



FLICK

To scroll through a list or move quickly, *flick* across the touchscreen (drag quickly and release).

Tip: When you flick a long list, touch the screen to stop it from scrolling.

MY SIGN

Draw the sign for the action you want. For example, draw an upsidedown "V" to go to airplane mode.

To see which actions are already assigned to gestures, press Menu 🔠 > List Gestures. You'll also see several gestures that are unassigned.

To assign an action to a gesture, press Menu 🔡 > List

Gestures, touch an unassigned gesture, then touch an app from the list.


To create a new gesture, press Menu 🔡 > Add Gesture, select an action from the list, and draw a gesture to assign to the action.

Get a closer look at maps or pictures. To zoom in, double-touch the screen. To zoom out, double-touch the screen again.

Tip: For maps you can also touch **Q** to zoom in, or **Q** to zoom out.

You can also zoom in or out by pinching your fingers together or moving them apart on the screen.



KEY TIPS FRONT KEYS



- Home — Press to return to the home screen.
 Press and hold to see recently used apps.
- Menu 🔠 Open options.
- Talk Press to start a call, or press and hold to start voice control.
- End/Power Press to end a call or press and hold to open the power key menu, where you can turn off the phone (Power off), or turn Airplane mode or Silent mode on or off.
- Back Return to the previous screen.

SLEEP & WAKE UP

To save your battery, prevent accidental touches, or when you want to wipe smudges off your touchscreen, put the touchscreen to sleep by pressing Screen Lock (1). To wake up the



pressing Screen Lock (1) . To wake up the touchscreen, just press Screen Lock (1) again.

To change how long your phone waits before the screen goes to sleep automatically, touch

Settings > Sound & display > Screen timeout.

Tip: To make the screen lock when it goes to sleep, use "**screen Lock**" on page 57.

ADJUST VOLUME

Press the volume keys to change the ring volume (in the home screen), or the earpiece volume (during a call).



SPIN THE SCREEN

The touchscreen can rotate to stay right-side up when you turn your phone:

Find it: Settings > Sound & display > Orientation

Note: Not all applications are designed to rotate.

HOME SCREEN

quick access to the things you need most

OUICK START: HOME SCREEN

The *home screen* gives you all your latest information in one place. It's what you see when you turn on the phone or press Home (a). It's basically like this:



Note: Your home screen might look a little different.

The home screen extends beyond what you see on the screen to give you more room for adding shortcuts, widgets, and more. Flick the home screen left and right to see more panels or to add widgets or shortcuts.



USE & CHANGE YOUR HOME SCREEN

On your home screen, *shortcuts* are icons that open your favorite apps, web bookmarks, contacts, email, or music. *Widgets* show you news, weather, messages, and other updates.

 To open something, touch it. Touch Home to return to the home screen.

- To add something or change your wallpaper, touch and hold an empty spot until you see the Add to Home screen menu.
- To move or delete something, touch and hold it until you feel a vibration, then drag it to another spot, another panel, or the trash at the bottom of the screen.

SEARCH

To search, press Search Q, and touch the text field to bring up the keypad.



NOTIFICATIONS & PHONE STATUS

At the top of the screen, icons on the left notify you about new messages or events (notifications). Icons on the right tell you about phone status. Flick the bar down to show notification details

Tip: To see today's date, touch and hold the status bar at the top of the screen.

NOTIFICATION LIGHT

Your phone has a light that blinks whenever you receive voicemail, email, text message, have an appointment, or your battery is low.



APP MENU

You can find all of your apps in one place. From the home screen, touch the app tab, ot open the app menu.

To close the app menu, press Home (a) or Back (5).

RECENT APPS

In the home screen, touch and hold Home (a) to see the most recent apps you used. Touch an app to open it, or touch Home (a) to return to the home screen.

DIALING OPTIONS

Find it: Dialer



IN-CALL OPTIONS



Tip: You can press Home (a) or Back (5) to leave the active call display. To reopen it, press Talk (1).

Note: Using a mobile device or accessory while driving may cause distraction and may be illegal. Always obey the laws and drive safely.

MAKE & ANSWED CALLS

To make a call, touch **Dialer**, enter a number.

To answer a call, press Talk .

To end a call, press End/Power .

ENTER NUMBERS DURING A CALL

To enter numbers during a call, touch **Dialpad**.

RECENT CALLS

Find it: Dialer > Call log

- group call icon on the right.
- To send a text message, create a contact, view a contact, or other options, touch and hold an entry.
- To clear the list, press Menu > Delete All.

Tip: From the home screen, press Talk to open the Call log.

FREOUENT CALLS

Find it: Dialer > Favorites

 To call a number, touch it to open the contact entry. then touch the phone number or PTT number you want to call

 To send a text message, view a contact, or other options, touch and hold an entry.

CALL WAITING

When you receive phone call during an active call. touch Answer to put the current call on hold and answer the new call

To make another call during an active call, touch Add call to place the current call on hold and dial a new number

Touch Switch Calls to move between the active call and the call on hold.

CONFEDENCE CALLS

To start a conference call, call the first number. After, they answer, touch Add call and call the next number. When the next number answers, touch Merge call.

VOLID DHONE NUMBER

Find it: Settings > About phone > Status > My phone number

UNANSWERED CALLS

If you receive a phone call and press End/Power before it goes to voicemail, you can send an automatic text message to the other caller.

Find it: Settings > Call settings > Auto Text reply > Incoming call or Outgoing call

EMERGENCY CALLS

Note: Your service provider programs one or more emergency phone numbers (such as 911 or 112) that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked. Emergency numbers vary by country. Your pre-programmed emergency numbers) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

- 1 Touch Dialer. If your phone is locked, touch Emergency Call on the unlock screen.
- 2 Enter the emergency number.
- **3** Press Talk up to call the emergency number.

Note: Your mobile device can use AGPS satellite signals to help emergency services find you (see "GPS & AGPS" on page 65).

COOL DOWN

In very limited circumstances, such as where your phone has been exposed to extreme heat, "Cool Down" message screens will appear. To avoid possible damage to your battery and phone, you should follow these instructions until the phone is within its recommended temperature range. When your phone is in "Cool Down" mode, only emergency calls can be made.

DUAL-MICROPHONE NOISE CANCELLATION

Improve call quality by removing the ambient noise around you to provide a cleaner, clearer sound to the person you're calling.



Note: Noise cancellation is on by default.

To turn off Noise cancellation, touch > Settings > Call settings > Noise cancellation.

PUSH-TO-TALK

one or more, talk to them all

PRIVATE CALLS

Private calls are push-to-talk calls between two people.

MAKE AND ANSWER PRIVATE CALLS

To make a private call:

 Touch Dialer, and enter the recipient's PTT number.

Tip: The first contact in **Contacts** contains your PTT number.



 Touch Contacts, and select a contact that has a PTT number.

To **talk**, press and hold the PTT Button. To **listen**, release the PTT Button.

To **answer** a private call, press the PTT Button after the caller has stopped talking.

To **end** a private call, press End/Power or do nothing. The call will end after a few seconds.

PTT RESUME

You can extend the automatic timeout of a PTT call by about 30 seconds.

Find it: Settings > Call settings > Push to Talk settings > Resume PTT

ONE TOUCH PTT

You can customize the PTT Button for quick access to push-to-talk functions.

Find it: Settings > Call settings > Push to Talk settings > One Touch PTT

Options	
Off	Turn off One Touch PTT .
Launch PTT Contacts List	Open a list of push-to-talk contacts on your phone.
PTT a selected contact	Start a private call with the selected contact.
PTT the most recent number	Start a push-to-talk call with the most recent PTT number in the Call log .

Tip: To add a quick switch for **One Touch PTT**, touch and hold a blank spot on your home screen, then touch **Motorola Widgets** > **One Touch PTT**.

CALL ALERTS

Use call alerts to tell someone you want to speak to them.

To send a call alert:

When you receive a call alert, you can:

- Answer: Push the PTT Button to begin a private call with the sender.
- Later: Store the call alert to Notifications.
- Dismiss: Dismiss the call alert.

Note: Call alerts are moved to **Notifications** after a few minutes of inactivity. You won't be able to make phone calls or private calls until the call alert is moved, or you've chosen an option.

PUSH TO SEND

During a private call, you can send contacts, photos, events, or your contact info.

Find it: Touch Share > Share contact, Share picture, Share event, or Share my info

SWITCH FROM A PRIVATE CALL TO A PHONE CALL

For longer calls, you can switch from a private call to a phone call if the private call recipient has a phone number stored in **Contacts**.



During a private call, Touch Call.

UNANSWERED CALLS

If you receive an error when making a private call, or press End/Power to end an outgoing private call before it's answered, you can send a text message to the other caller.

Find it: Settings > Call settings > Auto text reply > Incoming call or Outgoing call

GROUP CALLS

Note: This feature may not be offered by your service provider.

Need to talk to more than one person at a time? With group calls you can talk to up to 20 people at a time.

Note: To store groups on your phone you need a group-call-capable SIM card. Contact your service provider for more information.

To **create** a group, touch **Contacts** > Menu **New Group**, and select the group members. Touch **Save** to save it in your contacts.

Note: If you don't enter a name for the group, it will be stored as "**Group**".

To **make** a group call, touch **Contacts**, select the group you wish to call and press the PTT Button.

TALKGROUPS

Have a larger audience than 20 people? Talkgroups are the solution.

Note: Availability of Talkgroups, and the maximum number of Talkgroup members, is dependent on your service provider. Contact your service provider to establish a Talkgroup.

JOIN A TALKGROUP

Before you can make a Talkgroup call, you'll need to join the Talkgroup.

- 2 Select the Talkgroup in your contacts.
- **3** Touch **Join**.

MAKE A TALKGROUP CALL

 Touch Dialer, enter the Talkgroup number and press the PTT Button.

Tip: Talkgroup numbers begin with a #. For example #155.

 Touch Contacts, select the Talkgroup and touch Push to Talk (or press the PTT Button).

Tip: To silence incoming Talkgroup calls, press
Menu : > Settings > Call settings > Push to Talk
Settings > Talkgroups > Silence Talkgroups.

SET PUSH-TO-TALK SPEAKER

You can listen to push-to-talk calls through your phone's speaker or earpiece. Press Speaker (4) to turn the speaker on or off.




MOTOTALK™

Note: This feature may not be offered by your service provider.

MOTOtalk allows for off-network calls between MOTOtalk enabled phones.

Find it: Touch > Mototalk

Tip: The status bar shows your channel and code.



Note: Range will vary based on terrain, man-made structures and atmospheric conditions.

Tip: To add a quick switch for MOTOtalk, touch and hold a blank spot on your home screen, then touch **Motorola Widgets** > **Mototalk**.

These features and main menu items aren't available while in MOTOtalk:

- On-network phone or PTT calls
- Data transmission
- · Incoming message notification
- · Call forwarding
- Call alerts
- SMS or MMS messaging
- Push to send

TALK RANGE

While in MOTOtalk mode, phones should be a minimum of 6 feet apart.

STANDARD MOTOTALK CALLS

Note: When making a standard MOTOtalk call, everyone on your channel and code can hear your conversation.

To make a standard MOTOtalk call, press the PTT Button.

Note: You can only make standard MOTOtalk calls while on the home screen.

Release the button to listen for a reply.

If you receive an error message, it may mean:

- No one is on your channel or code.
- You're out of range.

Note: A MOTOtalk call can be ended at any time by pressing End/Power .

RECEIVE ALL MOTOTALK CALLS

You can set your phone to receive all calls on a channel.

Find it: Touch > Mototalk > Code > Receive

Note: You cannot initiate a code call when the code is set to **Receive All**.

PRIVATE MOTOTALK CALLS

To have a private conversation without other people listening in, you can make a private MOTOtalk call.

Find it: Touch Mototalk > Code > Private
Only

Note: The person you're calling must be in MOTOtalk and on the same channel to receive your call.

To make a private MOTOtalk call:

1 Enter the phone number of the person you want to call, or scroll to a number or name in Contacts or Call log.

- 2 Press and hold the PTT Button to talk.
- 3 Release the PTT Button to listen.

If you receive an error message:

- · The PTN you entered is invalid.
- The person you're trying to call is in network mode.
- The person you're trying to call is on a different channel.
- You're out of range.

MOTOTALK REMINDER NOTICE

You can set your phone to alert you that you've used MOTOtalk for a specified time.

Find it: Touch Mototalk > Reminder notice

MAKE EMERGENCY CALLS WHILE IN MOTOTALK

If you attempt to make an Emergency 911 call while in MOTOtalk mode, your phone will automatically exit MOTOtalk mode and attempt to find a network signal.

If you are out of network coverage your phone will not be able to make an emergency 911 cellular call until you go back into the network coverage area.



Use Gmail™

All your Gmail contacts will automatically get synced to your phone. Various computer applications for mobile phones and email accounts allow you to export your contacts as a "CSV" file. 

CREATE MESSAGES

Enter the recipient and message. Press Menu 🔠 for options, like **Insert smiley** or **Attach**.

Note: Attachments are available with MMS messaging only. Contact your service provider to find out if MMS messaging is available.

SEND & RECEIVE ATTACHMENTS

To send a file in a message, open a new message and press Menu () > Attach.

When you receive a message with an attachment, open the message and touch the file name to download it. Then, touch the name again to open it. Some file formats can be converted to HTML for faster viewing, and your phone will show a button that says **Get HTML version**.

MESSAGE GROUPS

You can create a message group to send messages to groups of up to 20 contacts.

- When you're finished adding members to the group, touch Save.
- 3 Type a name for the message group in the Name field.

Note: If you don't provide a name for the message group, the default name will be **(Message Group)**.

CORPORATE CALENDAR

Find it: 0 > 31 Calendar

Corporate calendar appointments are shown in the same calendar as your phone's calendar appointments, but each are shown in a different color. Once you configure your corporate account, you can start the calendar app to view, add, and manage your corporate calendar appointments.

Tip: To see the color codes for your calendar, press Menu 🔠 > More > Calendars

CORPORATE DIRECTORY

To view your company's directory, touch **o** > **corporate directory**.

VOICEMAIL

When you have a new voicemail, ∞ shows at the top of your screen. To hear the voicemail, drag the notification bar down and touch the voicemail, or touch Dialer, then touch ∞ .

GOOGLE TALK™

Google Talk instant messaging lets you chat via instant message with other Google Talk users on phones or on the web.

Find it: O > M Talk

Touch to change your online status message.



Press Menu 📳 to send invitations, add new friends, and more.

Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Exposure to RF Energy

Your mobile device contains a transmitter and receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your mobile device, the system handing your call controls the power level at which your mobile device transmits. Your mobile device is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

RF Energy Operational Precautions

For optimal mobile device performance, and to be sure that human exposure to RF energy does not exceed the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always follow these instructions and precautions:

- When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your mobile device just like you would a landline phone.
- If you wear the mobile device on your body, always place the mobile device in a
 Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness. If you do not
 use a body-wom accessory supplied or approved by Motorola and are not using the
 mobile device in the intended use positions along side the head in the phone mode or

Two-Way Radio Operation

Your radio product has been designed and tested to comply with national and international standards and guidelines regarding human exposure to RF electromagnetic energy, when operated in the two-way mode (at the face, or at the abdomen when using an audio accessory) at usage factors of up to 50% talky50% listen.

Specific Absorption Rate (IEEE)

Your model wireless phone meets the governmental requirements for exposure to radio waves.

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured to not exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government and by the Canadian regulatory authorities. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The standards include a substantial safety margin designed for the safety of all persons, regardless of age or health, and to account for any variations in measurements.

The exposure standard for mobile devices employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The IEEE SAR limit set by the FCC and by the Canadian
